Studies in Philemon: Lesson Two

"Paul, a prisoner of Christ Jesus..."

Paul gave himself three titles when he wrote to the churches, <u>apostle</u>, <u>slave</u>, and <u>prisoner</u>. At the writing of this letter the Apostle Paul was under house arrest in Rome (Acts 28:30-31) where he remained for two years, following two years in prison in Caesarea awaiting a trial before Caesar. Although he is in a rented house, he is still chained night and day.

Paul's Physical Description

Early church eyewitness accounts have left us some clear descriptions of the Apostle Paul's physical appearance. It's not flattering. In the Apocryphal book The Acts of the Apostles as description given is as follows:

"A man of small stature, with a bald head and crooked legs, in good state of body, with eyebrows meeting and nose somewhat hooked, full of friendliness; for now he appeared as a man, and now he had the face of an angel."

Other descriptions say that he was a <u>small man</u> of three meters in height (4' 6") He was <u>balding</u> with thin <u>reddish hair</u> and a <u>shiny head</u>. He had a <u>long hooked nose</u>, his <u>eyebrows were thick</u> with no break in the middle. He had <u>large eyes</u>, and his <u>legs were crooked</u> and his <u>knees protruding</u>. From some of his letters we understand he had bad eyesight (Gal. 6:11). The ridicule from his detractors in Corinth accused him of writing strong letters, but in his <u>physical presence he was weak</u>, and his <u>speech was despicable</u>. By that many have inferred that Paul had some kind of speech impediment or at best a <u>raspy irritating voice</u>. (2 Cor. 10:10) His sermons were so boring he put people to sleep. Here is a great man of God imprisoned in a lousy body.

Paul Described His Previous Life

Paul was born a citizen of Rome in city of Tarsus. His father was and important figure to have earned his citizenship, though a Jew. Paul was sent to Jerusalem for his education. He studied at the feet of Gamaliel, one of Israel's foremost scholars. Paul was the <u>head of his class</u>, probably a child prodigy. He <u>excelled in knowledge</u> and <u>zeal for the law</u>. He was a Pharisee by doctrine. He <u>persecuted the church</u> and tried to stamp it out. (Acts 22:3-20). By his own admission he was the <u>worst of sinners</u>. (Galatians 1:13, 1 Timothy 1:13-15)

Galatians 1:13 I persecuted the church and wasted (destroyed) it

For you have heard of my previous way of life in Judaism, <u>how intensely I persecuted the church of God and tried to destroy it</u>. 14 I was advancing in Judaism beyond many Jews of my own age and was extremely zealous for the traditions of my fathers.

1 Timothy 1:13, 15 Blasphemer, persecutor, and odious, (offensive)

Even though I was once a <u>blasphemer</u> and a <u>persecutor</u> and a <u>violent man</u>, I was shown mercy because I acted in ignorance and unbelief. 15 Here is a trustworthy saying that deserves full acceptance: Christ Jesus came into the world to save sinners--<u>of whom I am the worst</u>.

2 Cor. 10:10 Letter weighty but physically weak and speech is despicable.

For some say, "His letters are weighty and forceful, but <u>in person he is unimpressive</u> and <u>his speaking amounts to nothing</u>."

Paul Described His Suffering for Christ

He met Jesus in a face to face encounter with the resurrected Lord on his way to Damascus to arrest and execute Christians. God transformed his life and turned his upside down and inside out. He had been filled with the Holy Spirit and through him God did amazing miracles, casting out demons, healing the sick, and raising the dead. Though the Apostle Paul became the most famous disciple next to Peter, his life was filled with conflict and struggles from within the church and from without. Though he was powerfully used of God nothing came easy for Paul.

Second Corinthians gives us a clear insight of Paul's constant suffering which far above and beyond what any other apostle had to endure. Read these passages and you will see a man troubled on every side and blocked at every turn. Bad luck followed him around like buzzing knats, but in all this he kept a smile on his face and a song in his heart believing that "all things work together for good to them that love God who are called according to his purpose." (Romans 8:28) and that "Therefore I take pleasure in infirmities, in reproaches, in necessities, in persecutions, in distresses for Christ's sake: for when I am weak, then am I strong."

Paul's Constant Suffering

2 Corinthians 4:7-12

But we have this treasure in jars of clay to show that this all-surpassing power is from God and not from us. 8 We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; 9 persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. 10 We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus, so that the life of Jesus may also be revealed in our body.

2 Corinthians 6:4-10

Rather, as servants of God we commend ourselves in every way: in great endurance; in troubles, hardships and distresses; 5 in beatings, imprisonments and riots; in hard work, sleepless nights and hunger; 6 in purity, understanding, patience and kindness; in the Holy Spirit and in sincere love; 7 in truthful speech and in the power of God; with weapons of righteousness in the right hand and in the left; 8 through glory and dishonor, bad report and good report; genuine, yet regarded as impostors; 9 known, yet regarded as unknown; dying, and yet we live on; beaten, and yet not killed; 10 sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; poor, yet making many rich; having nothing, and yet possessing everything.

2 Corinthians 11:23-30

Are they servants of Christ? (I am out of my mind to talk like this.) I am more. I have worked much harder, been in prison more frequently, been flogged more severely, and been exposed to death again and again. 24 Five times I received from the Jews the forty lashes minus one. 25 Three times I was beaten with rods, once I was stoned, three times I was shipwrecked, I spent a night and a day in the open sea, 26 I have been constantly on the move. I have been in danger from rivers, in danger from bandits, in danger from my own countrymen, in danger from Gentiles; in danger in the city, in danger in the country, in danger at sea; and in danger from false brothers. 27. I have labored and toiled and have often gone without sleep; I have known hunger and thirst and have often gone without food; I have been cold and naked. 28 Besides everything else, I face daily the pressure of my concern for all the churches. 29 Who is weak, and I do not feel weak? Who is led into sin, and I do not inwardly burn? 30 If I must boast, I will boast of the things that show my weakness.

2 Corinthians 12:7-10

To keep me from becoming conceited because of these surpassingly great revelations, there was given me a thorn in my flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me. Three times I pleaded with the Lord to take it away from me. 9 But he said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness."

Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me. That is why, for Christ's sake, I delight in weaknesses, in insults, in hardships, in persecutions, in difficulties. For when I am weak, then I am strong.

Application

- God has given, or allowed, each one of us weaknesses, trials, troubles, and testings for His glory so that the excellent power might be of God, and not of us.
- We can decide to live pouting and wallowing in our misfortunes, OR we can decide to live joyfully in them for the glory of God. Paul said, "In whatever state I find myself I can be content."
- We are all <u>prisoners of something</u> -- a sickness, weakness, inability, handicap, limitation, education, bankruptcy, failure, poverty, job loss, divorce, etc.
- We lose our <u>defeatist attitude</u> when we decide that our present circumstances are ordered by the Lord. Thus, nothing is an accident, Satan didn't win, accidents don't happen, life isn't unfair, we didn't get the short end of the straw, we aren't cursed, and nobody is out to get us, and God's not punishing you, and He hasn't forgotten you.

Romans 8:28

Was certainly Paul's deep rooted philosophy for living though hardships.

We know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to <u>his purpose</u>. (Rom. 8:28)

I can do <u>all things</u> through Christ who strengthens me. (Philip. 4:19)

Therefore, I <u>rejoice in tribulation</u>, distresses, etc. for when I am weak then I am strong.

How do you view yourself in Christ Jesus?

Are you a prince or a pauper, a saint or a sinner, a victor or a victim, a loser or a winner?

- 1. What is the worst thing that every happened to you? Tell your story.
- 2. What has been the hardest test of your faith? Share your experience.
